

RECEIVING THE HOLY EUCHARIST – those who believe in the true presence of Christ in the Holy Eucharist are invited to partake of this Holy Sacrament. It is the practice of the PNCC to distribute the Holy Eucharist through the method of intinction. The Body and Blood of Christ are placed on the tongue, not in the hand.

Commemoration of saints this week

January 1 – *Peter of Atroa* – *Abbot* – (773-837) Born near Ephesus, Asia Minor, he became a monk when he was 18. He was ordained several years later. He was accused of practicing magic and using the devil because of the miracles he performed, but he was completely cleared by St. Theodore.

Telemachus – Martyr – (died 400) He was an Eastern ascetic who was stoned to death in Rome when he tried to stop a contest between gladiators in the arena. His death, according to Theodoret, caused Emperor Honorius to abolish gladiatorial contests.

January 2 – *Macarius of Alexandria* – *Abbot, Confessor* – (300-390) Born in Upper Egypt, he became a hermit. He was accused of assaulting a woman but proved his innocence and became a hero for his patience and humility during his trying ordeal.

Adelard of Corbie – Abbot – (753-827) He was a son of King Pipin's brother, became a monk at Corbie, Picardy. He was brought to the court by his cousin Charlemagne and became one of his advisers. His reputation for holiness, austerity, and concern for the poor and the sick spread.

January 3 – *Antherus of Rome* – *Bishop, Martyr* – (died 236) He was elected Bishop of Rome on Nov. 21,235, but ruled only 43 days when he died, probably as a martyr.

Genevive of Paris – Virgin – (422-500) Born near Paris, France, she dedicated herself to God when only 7. When her parents died, she moved to Paris and became a nun at 15. Her visions and prophecies

evoked hostility from the inhabitants of Paris. Many miracles were reported at her tomb in the church, which was later renamed in her honor.

Peter Balsam – Martyr – (died 311) He was arrested during the persecution of Christians under Emperor Diocletian and brought before the governor, Severus. When he refused Severus' plea that he sacrificed to the gods, he was tortured; when he persisted, he was crucified on January 11.

January 4 – *Gregory of Langres* – *Bishop* – (died 539) Count of Autun, France, he ruled the area wisely and well for 40 years. After his wife's death he was elected bishop of Langres and was known for his charities, austerities, and devotion to duty.

Pharaildis – **Virgin** – (died 740) She was married against her will, was badly treated by her husband when she refused him his martial rights because of her secret vow of virginity. She performed the numerous miracles.

Rigobert of Rheims – Bishop – (died 745) He was named archbishop of Rheims. He was venerated for his holiness and patience and was credited with performing miracles.

January 5 – Simeon the Stylite – Hermit – (390-459) He was a shepherd in his childhood. He became a monk at a stricter monastery, where he practiced such severe mortifications that he was dismissed from the monastery. He then became a hermit. In 423 he erected a tenfoot-high pillar and lived on the top of it; he spent the rest of his life living on successively higher pillars, which were no wider than 6 feet in diameter at the top; his pillar was 60 feet. He soon became greatly venerated as a holy man and had extraordinary influence.

Synletica – *Virgin* – (316-400) Born of wealthy parents, she refused the numerous suitors her beauty attracted, and when her parents died, she gave her inheritance to the poor. She consecrated herself to God, devoted herself to aiding the needy.

January 7 – *Lucian of Antioch* – *Martyr* – (died 312) Ordained as a priest he prepared an accurate version of the Old and New Testaments that was used by St. Jerome in preparing the Vulgate. He was arrested in Nicomedia in 303 when Diocletian's persecution of the Christians began. After a long imprisonment, when he refused to sacrifice to pagan gods, he was convicted of being a Christian, racked, and sworded to death on January 7.

Canute of Denmark – Martyr – (died 1086) – Illegitimate son of King Sweyn Estrithson of Denmark, he was unsuccessful in an attempt to claim crown of England in 1075 but became King of Denmark as Canute IV. He aided the clergy and missionaries, built many churches. His heavy taxes and disputes with the nobles led to rebellion headed by his brother Olaf. He was tracked down by the insurgents and he and 17 followers were slain on July 19 in the church of St. Alban in Odense, where he had taken refuge.

Prayer to St. Michael

Saint Michael, the Archangel, defend us in battle. Be our safeguard against the wiles and wickedness of the devil. Restrain him, o God, we humbly pray, and you, o Prince of the heavenly Host, by the power of God, cast into Hell Satan and all the evil spirits, who prowl about the world seeking the ruin and destruction of souls. Amen.
